When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said, 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.

TREASURED KNOWLEDGE

Jesus questions his disciples about popular perceptions of who he is. Their report shows that people cast him in familiar but totally inadequate roles. The reality requires a leap in imagination and faith achieved in Simon Peter's response: 'You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God'. Beyond being Messiah of Israel, Jesus is God's Son in a unique way.

Peter has conferred a title upon Jesus. Now Jesus confers a blessing and three roles upon him.

He is 'blessed', not because he is virtuous, but because God has revealed to him a knowledge that unaided human understanding could never achieve. Everything the Church has to say flows from this God-given knowledge of Jesus. This is the inexhaustible treasure that it holds in trust for the world.

Simon's first role is indicated by his name: 'Peter' (= 'Rock'). He is 'rock', again not because of his personal qualities, but because of his knowledge of Jesus. Built on this 'rock', the Church will be a community of life, against which the powers of death ('gates of the underworld') will not prevail.

The gift of keys, a biblical image (see the First Reading) signifies delegated authority (from Jesus) in the household of God (the Church).

The final role, 'binding and loosing', refers to the power to interpret and apply Jesus' authoritative teaching to new situations. In this way the Church, as both expression and foretaste of God's reign ('Kingdom of Heaven') on earth, is equipped to discern God's will in the changing circumstances that will confront its passage down the ages.





Entrance Antiphon:

Turn your ear, O Lord, and answer me; save the servant who trusts in you, my God. Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long.

Communion Antiphon:

The earth is replete with the fruits of your work, O Lord; you bring forth bread from the earth and wine to cheer the heart.

Saint Bartholomew – One of the twelve foundation stones of the Church, this apostle was from Cana in Galilee. Because the lists of the Twelve differ, Bartholomew is usually identified with Nathaniel of Cana, described in the fourth Gospel. Tradition holds that after the Ascension, he preached the Gospel in India or Armenia and was martyred there.

Saint Louis – born in 1214, Louis IX became King of France while quite young. A Franciscan tertiary, he was a model of prayer, kindness and Christian courtesy. Happily married, Louis cared for the people of France, educated his eleven children and tried to advance God's kingdom. He knew Saint Thomas Aquinas, who taught at the University of Paris. Louis undertook two Crusades to the Holy Land, and died, devoutly and ingloriously, near Carthage in Africa in 1270.

Saint Joseph Calasanz – born in Aragon, Spain in 1556, Joseph led the life of a rich, young man for 36 years. Converted to Christ, he gave up all his possessions to become a priest, zealous for the reform of the Church. Mysteriously attracted to Rome in 1592, he found there his true work – founding free schools to educate all classes. The schools and religious order (the Piarists) flourished in Europe. Joseph's latter years were most difficult. He died in 1648 and was canonised in 1767.

Saint Monica – was born in Roman Africa in 332, Monica was a young girl when she married Patricius, a non-Christian older man. They had four children and through Monica's prayer and influence, her husband received baptism. Monica poured out tears and prayers to God, for the conversion of her oldest son, Augustine. After he was baptised, Monica died peacefully in 387 in Ostia, Italy, her mission accomplished.

Saint Augustine – this great Doctor of the Church was born in 354 and had a most profound effect on Western theology. Before his conversion, Augustine was a Manichean, lived with a concubine and fathered a son. Through grace and his mother's prayers, he embraced Christianity and was baptised in Milan by Saint Ambrose. Returning to Africa, Augustine led an ascetic life and was elected Bishop of Hippo. He was a totally dedicated pastor for 34 years. By his sermons and prolific writings, he fought errors, explained the faith, and laid the foundations for much of Catholic social teaching and theology. Augustine died in 430, as the Vandals besieged Hippo and the Roman world was collapsing. Over the centuries, Augustine's 'Confessions' have become his most widely read work.

Passion of Saint John the Baptist – The execution of Saint John the Baptist is recorded in the Gospels (Matthew 14; Mark 6) and is placed by the historian, Josephus, at the fort of Macherus, near the Dead Sea. As early as the fifth century, a commemoration of Saint John the Baptist was kept on this day (29th August) at Jerusalem. It probably marks the anniversary of the dedication of the basilica in his honour at Sebaste (Palestine) where, according to tradition, he was buried.
