Project Compassion – Week 3 – Olivia's story – Tanzania

Twenty-Two year old Olivia lives in Tanzania with her farmer husband, two young sons and an adopted niece and nephew. She didn't have the opportunity to go to school, growing up and was embarrassed that she couldn't read, write or count. Around 25 per cent of Tanzanian girls and women cannot read or write, with many families unable to afford school fees or uniforms. Olivia's business was losing money. Then she attended Caritas Australia supported literacy and numeracy classes and set up a home classroom to teach her neighbours. Now her classes, business and family are thriving – and she aims to become a pastor and run for local leadership. Olivia aspires to 'Be More' and wants to help her community to achieve its vision of a better life for all. 'I am proud to be a teacher who helps others to achieve their dream', Olivia says.

Saint John of God – born in Portugal in 1495, John Cidade led an adventurous life in Spain. In his early forties, he was converted after hearing a sermon preached by St John of Avila. Thereafter, he dedicated himself totally to the sick and abandoned, and founded the Order of Brothers Hospitallers of St John of God. Honoured as patron of the sick, he died in 1550 and was canonised in 1690.

Saint Frances of Rome – Frances was born in 1384 and married at an early age and had three children. Each day after doing her domestic work she visited churches and cared for the poor. Even after two of her children died from the plague and her husband was wounded in a battle, she courageously continued her social work. She founded a Benedictine Oblate Congregation, which she herself entered after her husband died. Frances died in 1440.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

BEING TURNED UPSIDE DOWN

Lent has the capacity to shake us from our lethargy and turn our lives upside down. For some people change is exciting but for many it is less than comfortable as we search to find our bearings in a new situation. Today's readings can challenge us but they also provide a new set of bearings to help our journey in faith. The people of Israel had their world overturned when they were taken into slavery, but in some ways coming out of slavery was even more difficult. Led into the dangers of the desert and an uncertain future they were to find their bearings in the new covenant. Their new identity as God's people would find its expression in their faithfulness to the Ten Commandments. When Jesus overturned the tables of the money changers in the Temple he called into question the system that had developed around the Temple. His disturbing action was to be a reminder that even as one sign of God's presence was to pass away, it was soon to be replaced by a new sign of God's presence, his own Risen body.

Paul knew that God's wisdom always has a way of challenging the wisdom of the world. A crucified Christ was seen as madness and scandalous. As disturbing as it may still seem this is the wisdom of God that must become our point of reference. In Jesus crucified all our preconceptions of power and wisdom are called into question as we are invited to make God's wisdom our own.
